Composer's Notes

Dr. Robert Cueni, to whom this piece is dedicated and after whom the hymn melody is named, was the Senior Minister of Country Club Christian Church in Kansas City, Missouri from 1991 to 2002. The words of this anthem are his favorite hymn. It was written in his honor at his acceptance of the position of President of the Lexington Theological Seminary in Lexington, Kentucky. The anthem was sung at his last Sunday service in Kansas City

This early 20th century text uses nature as a metgaphor to express concepts and qualities of an individual's character. It celebrates aspects of personality which give us the ability to communicate trust and confidence in the midst of a cynical and difficult world. It does so without utilizing gender specific language, so, while being almost 100 years old, it inclusively speaks to all people in the presently diverse society of humanity

The music is stylistically compatible with the sensual nature of the text. The melody is quite pleasant, and the harmonization is not much unlike the music of early twentieth century hymn writers--quite warm and sophisticated. The organ part is rather symphonic in concept, which many organists enjoy as a current fashion in the early 21st century. Choirs seem to enjoy singing this piece of music. Perhaps it gives them a chance to experience something of a hint of what was thought of as "good" church music in a time 100 years past, as well as to sing words that still encourage us to reflect upon the "content of our characters".
