Composer's Note

In 1895 Oscar Wilde was imprisoned for two years for being a practicing homosexual, a crime in England at that time. Housman's poem, while seemingly tongue-in-cheek, was written in protest of Wilde's incarceration and a British court system so arbitary in its justice that a man could conceivably be imprisoned because of "the colour of his hair."

The poem references hard labor punishments for prisoners which may be unfamiliar to singers today. "Oakum" is tarred fiber used in caulking ships, made by picking apart old rope by hand. Prisoners had to pick 3 to 6 pounds per day, which caused lacerations and calluses on the hands. While the "treadmill" is known today as an exercise device, it originated as a means of producing power for grinding grain. Prisoners often were forced to walk the treadmill 8 to 10 hours per day, 15 minutes on and 5 minutes off.

DR. ROSS C. BERNHARDT is Director of Choral Activities and Associate Professor of Music at Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi, where he conducts Camerata Isla, University Singers, and teaches applied voice and choral methods. He received a Doctor of Musical Arts degree in choral conducting from Michigan State University, and Masters and Bachelors degrees from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro and the University of Missouri, respectively.

Dr. Bernhardt previously served as Chair of the Music Department and Director of Choral Activities at Lambuth University in Jackson, Tennessee. He also served on the faculties of Columbia College (Missouri) and Lansing Community College (Michigan) and was a high school choral director in southwest Virginia.

An internationally recognized composer, Dr. Bernhardt has won first prize in the Ithaca College Choral Composition Competition (US), Silliman Anthem Award Competition (US), Longfellow Choral Composition Competition (US), and Concurso Internacional Amadeus de Composición Coral (Spain), and special commendation in the Phoenix Choral Composition Competition (UK). His compositions have been published by Hinshaw, Mark Foster, and Colla Voce.
